Rewards

Changes to Statutory Guidance for School Attendance

You will be aware that improving school attendance is a national priority as research shows that excellent attendance ensures that children are successful not only in their education but have good wellbeing and life chances. To support this, the government has published statutory guidance that all schools must adopt from 19th August 2024 and Surrey Local Authority requests that all schools share the following information with parents.

There are new regulations coming into effect from **19th August 2024** which impact on penalty notices issued for an unauthorised leave of absence.

Penalty notices can and should be issued for 10 sessions (a session is a half day) of unauthorised absence. Please note schools are not able to authorise absences except in exceptional circumstances.

1. If a parent/carer has not incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children in a rolling 3 year period since 19 August 2024, then the penalty notice will be charged at the rate of £160.00, **per parent/carer per child**, if paid within 28 days. This will be reduced to £80.00 if paid within 21 days of receipt of the notice. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings against the parent/carer in the Magistrates Court.

2. If a parent/carer has incurred a penalty notice relating to this child/children since 19 August 2024, the rolling 3 year period will be activated from the date of the first penalty notice and the second penalty notice will be charged at the flat rate of £160.00, **per parent/carer per child**, if paid within 28 days. There will be no reduction for payment within 21 days. Failure to pay the Penalty Notice will result in Surrey County Council considering legal proceedings in the Magistrates Court.

3. If a parent/carer has incurred 2 penalty notices relating to this child/children in the rolling 3 year period since the first penalty notice was issued, then the parent/carer will NOT receive a third penalty notice – Surrey County Council will have no option but to consider a prosecution, **per parent/carer per child**, in the Magistrates Court under s 444 Education Act 1996.

We are aware that this update may concern some families but we committed to working in partnership and hold the belief that expecting excellent attendance for every child should also be our school priority as accepting anything less means letting children and families down. In September we will share our school attendance strategy and updated polices. They will reflect the changes to statutory guidance as well as focusing on how we will support children and celebrate when they achieve excellent attendance.


Artwork 2024





























Netball

Football

Our Year 7 football team deserve a special mention for their impressive achievement in reaching the final of the Guildford and District Schools Tournament.

The season began with victories versus Glebelands school (4-3), Woolmer Hill (3-2) and Christs College (5-1).

The Autumn Term ended with Kings attending a five team, six a side tournament held at Rodborough School. Kings won all of their matches, scoring 13 goals in the process and conceding only one.

The semi-final of the Guildford and District Schools Tournament was held at Kings College with County School visiting in a local derby. Kings were 3-0 at the end of the first half. County pulled one back at the start of the second half and continued pressure on Kings' defence suggested that a comeback might be possible. However, resolute defending, particularly from Oliver, Jacob, Callum and King saw Kings College turn things around before eventually winning 8-2. Tyree was the obvious man of the match, scoring seven of Kings' eight goals!

In the final, Kings faced a team from Howard of Effingham School. The boys put in an incredibly courageous performance against strong opposition. Having gone 3-1 down at the start of the second half, Kings fought back to make it 3-2 but were unable to find an equaliser. There was a sense that ultimately their only defeat of the season came against a school with much greater numerical resources to draw upon.

Although disappointed at the final result, the boys deserve a lot of praise and should take pride in their achievements in ultimately reaching the final. As they progressed they were able to claim victory against many of our local rivals, not only raising the profile of the school but also bringing a sense of excitement as their run unfolded.




Diversity Equality and Inclusion Update

This term Kings welcomed a guest speaker to talk to years 7-10 about the importance of gender equality and the negative effects of toxic masculinity.

Former Kings' Head of English, Matth Pinkett, returned to the school as a published author and expert on discussing the difficult topics of misogyny, and mental health. Matt is the author of "Boys Don't Try?: Rethinking Masculinity in Schools" and has been a guest speaker on the topic for various podcasts, Ted Talks and national news outlets.

Matt talked to students about the impact that gender stereotypes and assumptions can have on young women and men. Through engaging conversation and real life examples students were able to see how they can challenge behaviour that goes against our British Values of tolerance and mutual respect, in a safe and proactive way. Students felt that the presentation was useful as they learned how to "call in" their friends rather than pointing a finger of blame. This talk is another part of Kings' wider curriculum which prepares students to deal with tricky and uncomfortable situations and topics, and to stand up for their core values in a respectful and kind way. We felt very lucky to have Matt return to visit us, and know that students have really benefitted from his perspective and expertise.





Transition

We were delighted to invite our new Year 7's in for two days to give them some secondary school experience and prepare them for September. We completed a mixture of lessons throughout the two days including Geography, Maths, wellbeing, World of Books and trampolining to help them gauge what lessons at Kings will be like.

Transition days allow all of our new students a chance to have a taste of the different subjects at secondary school to reduce any worries for September and support their wellbeing.

Key staff delivered the lessons so that students are familiar with them prior to September, with the objective of reducing concerns they may have.

Transition days are a great opportunity to start the process of embedding a new school culture and highlight the positive, well-disciplined ethos in our school, ready for them to start their journey at Kings. We enjoyed spending time with them.





House System

The house system has been truly embedded into our culture of the school this year. This started with the name changing of tutor groups, to include the houses. On 11th July, eight Year 9 boys from Kings College Guildford had an exciting school trip to Wimbledon, their first time at the famous tennis tournament. Mr. Cushen organised the trip with support from Miss Reeves. The boys were thrilled to be there and looked forward to learning outside the classroom.

At Wimbledon, they saw live matches, including the men's doubles semi-finals, mixed doubles, and Great Britain's top-seeded men's wheelchair doubles match. They were amazed by the skill and determination of the players, which inspired them to appreciate the effort it takes to excel in sports.

The boys were especially captivated by the fast-paced action and strategic moves in the matches. They cheered loudly for their favourites and discussed the games excitedly. The experience left a big impression on them, sparking their interest in sports and teamwork.

Overall, the trip was not just fun but also educational, teaching the boys about sportsmanship and the thrill of competition. It was a day they will remember, with some even feeling inspired to pursue their own athletic goals in the future.





Thorpe park trip

On the 28th June, our Year 10's went on a day trip to experience the maths, science and geography of Thorpe Park, as well as enjoy a rollercoaster or two. Leading up to the trip, students explored how these subjects apply to this real-life setting. In Science, students experimented with the physics behind rollercoasters by designing and building their own track. In Maths, students focused on the business side of theme parks by designing their own park, setting ticket prices and creating marketing plans with the goal of optimising their profit. Finally, in Geography, students explored the effect Thorpe Park has on tourism, exploring a case study of the location. Students were very enthusiastic about the whole experience and it was a wonderful chance to see them connect their learning to real life.



Food Tech

Year 7 students have been introduced to the foundational skills necessary for success in the kitchen. They have learned about kitchen safety, hygiene, and the importance of organisation. Students have practiced essential cooking techniques such as chopping, mixing, and measuring. These skills were put to the test as they prepared simple dishes like vegetable stir-fry, fruit salads, pizza and by far the most favourite cinnamon rolls.

Year 8 students have been building on the skills they acquired last year. They have tackled more complex recipes and techniques, focusing on precision and creativity in their cooking. They were able to put some of these skills into practice when we made lasagna which some students were reluctant to make at first but tried it and loved it. Students have expressed great enthusiasm for the hands-on learning experiences in Food Technology. Many have discovered a passion for cooking and are eager to continue exploring this field next year.

Some of the students have expanded their skills further within afterschool cooking club where we have made bread, iced and piped cakes, and produced some great savoury products.














What a great academic year it's been in Languages. We have seen students of all abilities in all years continue to make excellent progress and further develop their skills and love of languages through engaging offline and online learning activities, in and outside of the classroom.

Year 7 have continued to be supported by Latin Club, which with its strong links to French and Spanish, has enabled them to be more successful. Several Year 10 and 11 students also took GCSE's in their home languages, supported by our team.

In June, Year 10 Language students attended Woking College's History and Languages Challenge Day. Students took part in translation and interpretation activities, learning from A Level French and Spanish tutors. This was an ideal opportunity to work with experts and see what studying a language at college could be like.

Our Languages trips have also been organised with a cross-curricular focus, highlighting the added value of Languages when combined with other subjects. In the Spring term, Kings Languages students enjoyed an action-packed Languages and History educational trip to Normandy. Following on from the success of this trip, Languages and Art have organised an educational trip to Barcelona in March 2025.






Latin Club

Latin club had its final session of the year. Very appropriately, the Y7s were learning about Elections in Rome.
