

Dear families.

It seems incredible that we're already at the end of term as so much has been packed into a short space of time. For year 11s, it's been a highly focused five and a half weeks as they prepare for the opportunity to show off the fruits of their hard work over the last few years in their GCSE exams. I am extremely grateful to all of the staff who have offered additional support, guidance, enthusiasm and expertise in sessions before school, during lunchtimes and after school - as well as those offering further support during the holidays. We are fortunate to have an incredibly committed staff body who are justly proud of their school and the students that they work with. Mrs Ward has done an excellent job of guiding, encouraging and motivating our students and they can gain great confidence from the continued hard work and efforts they are demonstrating.



Even as we think about the Year 11s and their next steps, we have one eye on the new group of students joining us in September, with our transition programme starting apace in the upcoming term. I am delighted to report that Kings continues to be oversubscribed for September 2024.

In her novel, The Secret Garden, Frances Burnett describes the coming of spring as "the sun shining on the rain". This feels rather apt as the skies have deluged us with water for what seems forever. Thankfully, our new roofing project has held firm and is approaching the completion of phase one on the main, three story building. This will continue over the coming months down the DT corridor. You'll also see a development of our solar panels, as we try to embrace greener technology and save on our electricity costs in the coming years.

Over Easter we will be installing new fencing and controlled gates around the rear car park, as part of our estates strategy to improve our facilities and ensure the safety of our students. Hopefully this will not inconvenience families, as I know people are now used to collecting and dropping off students off site.

We have now completed all of the work on the RAAC in the school sports halls, and as a result they are fully operational again. Our thanks go to Surrey Sports Park for their support in ensuring students continued to access great facilities for their PE lessons during this time and to the PE team at Kings for their adaptability with the curriculum. As ever, we are ambitious to develop our sporting facilities still further and hope to announce a major new project in the next half term.

Outside of the classroom we've worked with colleagues and students at Surrey University as our partnership continues, including Year 7s and 8s learning some veterinary skills and Year 10s engaging in Saturday workshops on all things from law to engineering. Performing Arts students have had a go at developing their experience behind the scenes at the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre, whilst some of our female students have tried their hands at engineering at a STEM event at Guildford College. We've even had a go at bush tucker trials for Comic Relief, raising over £300 for charity be eating unpleasant things. Last week we embarked on another international trip to Normandy to develop as linguists and historians. I think we're all due a rest!

Whatever your plans are for the next few weeks, we hope you enjoy the school break and look forward to seeing students on Monday the 15th of April.

A reminder to parents and carers that if you take your children out of school, without permission from the Principal, for five or more days (which do not have to be consecutive), you will be liable to receive a penalty notice.

Currently, the amount payable, under a penalty notice, is £60 per parent/carer, per child, if paid within 21 days. Thereafter, the amount increases to £120, if paid between 21 and 28 days. If the penalty notice remains unpaid after 28 days, the Local Authority will consider a prosecution in the Magistrates Court.

Languages and History Trip to Normandy, France

Last week 33 Year 9 and 3 Year 11 students enjoyed an action packed Languages and History four-day educational trip to Normandy, visiting a wide range of cultural attractions and sites of great historical significance.

Our trip commenced with a visit to the Canadian Parachute Regiment Memorial in Varaville in Normandy, commemorating the vital role of the paratroopers in World War II on June 6, 1944, when soldiers of the 1st Canadian Parachute Battalion parachuted into Normandy and overwhelmed German defences. We then visited Merville Battery, a key site attacked by the 9th Battalion of The Parachute Regiment as part of D-Day.



The following day students visited Pegasus Bridge, the site of the first building and family in France to be liberated from the Nazi occupation. We then visited Ranville British and Commonwealth War Cemetery, where we learnt and reflected on the stories of three British airborne casualties and a military para dog buried with Pte Corteil, which helped to give students a much more personal and human historical perspective, amongst the 2562 burials.



We then visited the Catholic Church next to the cemetery which has a special corner, dedicated to the British and Canadian liberation of Ranville, the first village to be liberated. On the same day we visited the German and American War Cemetery to experience the cultural contrast in the way in which different countries remember and honour their war dead.

In the afternoon we visited a traditional Cider Farm, where the local farmer explained the whole process of making apple juice from the harvesting of 15,000 apple trees to the annual production of 50,000 bottles of apple juice. Students then enjoyed apple juice tasting. The farmer also explained the fermentation process involved in the production of cider and calvados. Finally, we visited Omaha and Gold Beaches, where thousands of Allied troops landed during World War II.



On the third day of our trip Kings students very much enjoyed a visit to Noémie's goat farm in Firfol. They stroked and fed the goats and then the farmer invited them to taste some of the goats cheese. Many then used their French language skills to buy some of the cheese. We then travelled to Arromanches-les-Bains, a coastal town. We walked around the town, with students using their French language skills in shops and cafes, where they enjoyed a drink and snack.

In the afternoon we visited Arromanches beach and students created a human Mulberry Harbour wall, to recreate the actual wall constructed by British forces in the sea as part of their liberation strategy. This was followed by a visit to the circular 360 cinema to watch archive footage filmed by war correspondents in 1944, and then we travelled on to Gold Beach, the landing beach of the British 50th Northumbrian Division. We then visited Juno beach and a French supermarket to practise language skills.



Our Year 11's laid a wreath and Grace read the poem 'Normandy' by Cyril Crain at the British & Commonwealth War Memorial which was built in 2019 to commemorate 75 years since the British & Commonwealth contributions to the liberation of Normandy.



On the final day of our trip before the road trip to Calais Ferry Port we visited the picturesque small town of Bayeux where students saw the world-famous Bayeux tapestry, an embroidered cloth nearly 70 metres long. It depicts the events leading up to the Norman conquest of England. Students also had the opportunity to see the impressive Bayeux Cathedral and enjoyed a walk around this beautiful town.



Finding Our Futures – University of Surrey

We have had a busy module with lots of careers and aspiration activities taking place across the school! In January, we were visited by the Smallpeice Trust who ran a STEM day for some of our Year 9s where they worked in teams to design, solder, glue, build and market sustainable water pumps. It was great to see so many future engineers!



In February, some of our Year 8s attended two days at the University of Surrey learning about higher education, taking part in exciting subject tasters and working with current students to learn more about university life. On the third day, they celebrated with a graduation ceremony at school with parents and carers.





Our Year 10 Performing Arts students had a fantastic morning at the Yvonne Arnaud Theatre earlier this month learning from the director, marketing team and sound/lighting technicians. They also heard from graduates from GSA (Guildford School of Acting) about routes into Drama School. It was really interesting to learn about all the creative careers within the theatre industry. We have a few Y10 students returning to the theatre for work experience in July, which is a great opportunity to further their understanding of different roles.

To make links between subjects and future jobs, we were visited by four Economics students who worked with Year 10 in Maths lessons to teach them about future pathways into Economics and how the subject links to many day to day aspects of life, including inflation, the cost of living and budgeting.



Some of our female scientists in Years 7 and 8 visited Guildford College last week to take part in four interactive STEM workshops – they built wind turbines with SATRO, tried their hand at civil engineering, learnt about game design and music technology with ACM, and heard about the future of the automotive industry with Lexus. A great day with lots of learning and problem solving skills!

Last week we had a brilliantly engaging and practical workshop with Animal Aspirations, a group of Veterinary Medicine students from the University who aim to promote diversity within the vet profession. Some of our Year 7s and 8s prepared for surgery putting on gloves and gowns, used microscopes to diagnose potential illness and bandaged model dogs.



We are also proud of our Year 9s who took part in Family Futures, an extracurricular programme run by the University across three months, where they have been exploring their future pathways and options with parents/carers at home. Well done also to the Year 10 students who have been taking part in Realise Your Potential, a Saturday programme where students visit the University campus to try subject tasters from law to engineering and everything in between! It was wonderful to hear your final presentations and watch you formally graduate a few weeks ago.



Working with Home Office 'PREVENT', The Police and Crime Commissioner and Children's Safeguarding Partnerships to help keep children safe online.



Music lessons


We are excited to announce that we have secured some music teachers from Surrey Arts to provide music lessons to our students who might be interested in learning an instrument.




